As caregiver for one of her daughters who is hearing and speech was unable to work

outside the home. Her husband, Sivayyan, worked long hours as a rickshaw driver.

Before they partnered with Save A Family Plan, they struggled to meet their family's basic needs plus extensive medical expenses. Their home was unlivable, with neither sanitation nor drinking water.

Through the Family Development Program, Chandrika and her family opened a small petty shop-then Covid struck and the income plummeted.

Thanks to the generosity of donors who contributed to the SAFP Covid Rehabilitation Program Fund,

full-time the family was able to make a new start. They opened a small restaurant, which now impaired, Chandrika provides a sustainable income for the family.

Chandrika's letter to her partner donors (translated):



The biggest blessing and achievement in our life is that we were able to build a home with facilities. We were living in a rented house and you helped us to give our children more attention and good education.

The classes and seminars I received through Save Family Plan empowered us to face life with confidence and get our rights met.

We thank you for all the blessings and benefits you have given in our lives and pray that God blesses all of your work.





Early this year, volunteer Greg DeSouza visited India along with Save A Family Plan Executive Director, Marisa Thorburn, and Board President, Lois Cote. We've asked Greg to share some of his first-hand experiences with you...

My journey began when Save a Family Plan invited me to travel to India for twenty-six days in January and February. I eagerly agreed. India, vast and complex, with a population of 1.4 billion, presents a rich tapestry of languages and cultures.

As a Canadian, I was struck by the widespread poverty in India. There, 83.8% live on less than US\$5.50 a day (2019 statistic). The roads, filled with vehicles, people, and animals, are utter chaos. One trip of 250 KM journey to Sultan Bathery in Wayanad District took 11.5 hours. It was rough going. In the Mykkara tribal colony, we met Chandrika, a Paniya tribal woman, her husband, and two daughters, (one of whom is both hearing and speech impaired). Indigenous villagers, the original inhabitants of the forests, are among the poorest in India. SAFP Field Coordinator, Lilly, has spent years building trust among the women of this community, and together they lead initiatives advocating for better schools, water, and housing.

In Shimoga, I came face to face with the reality of shocking violence when visiting a small shop run by a woman who had participated in the SAFP Family Development Program. As I was buying some gifts to take home for my grandchildren, I observed scars on her neck and arms. She explained that she had been lit on fire and abandoned by her husband. Partnering with SAFP, she has rebuilt her life and is now earning a stable income by running her own business.

I was able to witness the work of Save a Family Plan on multiple fronts where we have partnered with poor, hard-working people to improve and transform their lives. Projects for water purifiers that prevent disease, secure toilets for women and girls, and building decent homes.

Working with SAFP and each together, program families empower themselves to provide for themselves and their families. While poverty, domestic violence, and access to clean water are also issues in Canada, the scale of these challenges in India is staggering. We can't do everything, but we must do something. I am honored to be associated with SAFP.
